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LONDON DOCKLANDS 1981 - 1991: A DECADE OF ACHIEVEMENT

London Docklands has witnessed a decade of urban regeneration achievement, the London Docklands Development Corporation (LDDC) said today as it marked it's 10th anniversary.

Set up by Government in 1981, the LDDC has overseen a transformation in London Docklands's fortunes - on development, employment and training opportunities, housing, infrastructure, transport and the environment.

London Docklands in 1991 is the world's largest and most successful urban regeneration scheme which is significantly adding to the capital's standing as Britain's leading business centre and is poised to become one of the most important new commercial areas in Europe.

LDDC Chairman David Hardy said: "The LDDC was set up as a single minded body empowered to acquire land, put in basic infrastructure and encourage the private sector to invest energy, drive and funding into re-development, resulting in the creation of new houses, new jobs and new businesses.

"Today, an investment of some £1120 million of public money has triggered £8420 million from private sources. Working in partnership with private developers, the three local boroughs of Tower Hamlets, Newham and Southwark and many other statutory authorities, the balance of London is being shifted towards the East.

"London Docklands is where the most exciting developments in Europe's largest city will be happening over the next ten years."

Looking ahead to the potential of the future, LDDC Chief Executive Eric Sorensen said:

"The fundamental regeneration task is supporting the creation of thriving businesses and jobs. By the end of the century, jobs in London Docklands will increase from the present 53,000 to over 200,000. This compares with 27,000 when the LDDC began it's work in 1981.

"Jobs will only come if there is business confidence about the quality of transport and communications. Improvements in road and rail transport are well under way. What was a poorly served area will soon have excellent road, rail and underground links, better bus services, a new airport and new river transport.

"The integrated market for Western Europe in 1992 will have profound implications for London Docklands and the East Thames Corridor. Just as the boom years of the eighties brought major international companies from outside and inside the European Community flocking into London, so the impact of 1992 will create the second wave. London Docklands offers an excellent location.

"The Royal Docks once formed the greatest port complex in the world. Today they represent one of the largest areas of development potential in Europe. Infrastructure is in place, the road system is complete and the Docklands Light Railway extension to Beckton is on target for 1992."

Eric Sorensen concluded "The overall measure of success as we complete the LDDC's remit will be to engender a sense of civic pride in this area and ensure that London Docklands plays a full part in the larger, thriving capital city.

"We aim to enhance the quality of life for residents, those who work here and visitors. Building on a decade of achievement, this is our new challenge.
